Course overview

During this five week course we will explore a number of portraits of British Monarchs. We will discover the anonymous Wilton Diptych, Holbein's portrayal of Henry VIII, the evolving portraits of Elizabeth I throughout her life; the paintings of Charles I by Anthony Van Dyck, and several portraits of the de-facto monarch Oliver Cromwell. The course will introduce the lives of the artists, the historical and socio-political contexts of the paintings, and discuss the changing perceptions of the monarchy as shown in this 250 year long history. Images of the portraits will be available for you online. Come along and tap into your inner art-critic.

Course description

Portraying the monarch at any given historical moment could be a fraught proposition, involving the massaging of the sitter's ego, and the creation of the desired political statements through the paintings' iconography. We will discuss the nature of monarchy that each artist sought to promulgate, and discuss in detail the political necessity of each portrait's imagery. We shall observe that this is of paramount importance in the Tudor and Stuart eras, as the nature of the succession, and later the question of the Divine Right of Kings came to the fore.

Although we shall analyse each portrait in detail, assessing its craft and the individual artist's style, we will also discuss the historical context in which the portraits are produced, the

nature of patronage, and we will refer to literary texts and documents where appropriate. In this way, we shall come to appreciate that these images are far from static or passive, but are rather active and at the centre of the often febrile times in which they are created. This is of particular relevance in the years running up to and after the English Civil Wars, during the Protectorate under Oliver Cromwell.
