Course overview

The Romantic poet Percy Bysshe Shelley famously said that 'Poets are the unacknowledged legislators of the world.' Shakespeare's sonnets

Seventeenth-century (John Donne, Andrew Marvell, John Milton)

The Romantics (probably Wordsworth's 'Tintern Abbey' or Keats's 'The Eve of St Agnes')

Victorians (Tennyson, Matthew Arnold, Christina Rossetti)

Modernism: T. S. Eliot, 'The Waste Land'

Post-war: Larkin and Heaney

Poetry Today (Jack Underwood, Emily Berry, Rachael Allen)
